

SEQUATCHIE VALLEY SCENIC BYWAY

The Sequatchie Valley Scenic Byway highlights rocky bluffs overlooking a narrow valley that stretches more than 70 miles from the Tennessee River in South Pittsburg to the Head of the Sequatchie River at Cumberland Trail State Park. The valley's rich history includes Native American settlements, Civil War conflict sites, as well as remnants of railroad and coal mining industrial booms.

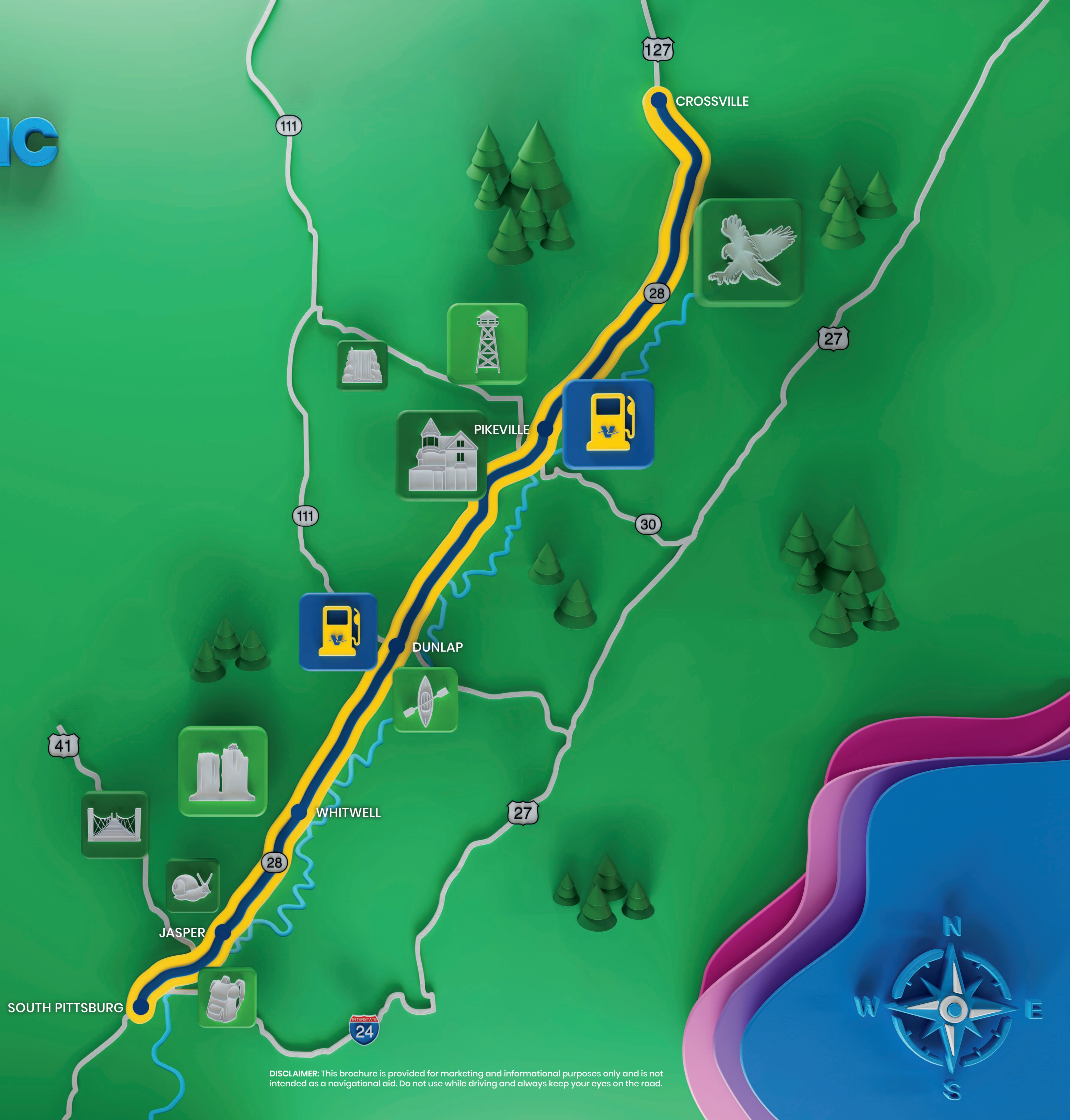
Where to Go

Start your day in Pikeville. Hike through Cumberland Trail State Park and Fall Creek Falls State Park, or stroll through the South Main Street Historic District for some shopping.

Then, continue down 28 to Dunlap and Whitwell where you can visit coal mining heritage museums, authentic southern restaurants, orchards, and vineyards. As you drive, take advantage of scenic overlooks of the valley's rolling hills.

Later, discover small towns like Jasper for opportunities to rock climb, skydive, and hike.

Finally, end in South Pittsburg where you can get a taste of local history before indulging in delicious cuisine and a theater performance.



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THE SEQUATCHIE VALLEY SCENIC BYWAY'S SIGHTS, SITES, AND SAVINGS



Cumberland Trail State Park & Head of the Sequatchie River

270 Glyph Parkway, Pikeville, TN, 37367

Hike the Falcon Warrior Trail, which goes from the start of the Sequatchie River to sites like Devilstep Hollow Cave and some of the most archaeologically significant pictographs, petroglyphs, and mud glyphs in the southeastern U.S.



Historic Fall Creek Falls Fire Lookout Tower

330 Fire Tower Road, Pikeville, TN, 37367

Constructed around 1947 for the Tennessee Division of Forestry's Fire Management program, the 60-foot tower sits atop the Cumberland Plateau's Big Hill. It offers sweeping views of Dixon Cove to the east and Gizzard Cove, Robinson Cove, and Denny Cove to the west.



South Main Street Historic District

Main Street, Pikeville, TN, 37367

The South Main Street Historic District spans over a third of a mile and comprises 25 primary properties. It features various architectural styles—including Queen Anne, Colonial Revival, and Bungalow—constructed between circa 1885 and 1935. The older buildings are concentrated in the northern part.



Valero Station

14904 Ranking Avenue, Dunlap, TN, 37327

Make sure you have enough gas in the tank to explore the whole byway. Fuel up with a discount that increases after every fourth fill up. Starting with 5c off per gallon* on your first four fill-ups. **Download the ValeroPay+ app to start saving.**



Foster Falls (South Cumberland State Park)

498 Foster Falls Road, Sequatchie, TN, 37374

Foster Falls is a stunning 60-foot waterfall surrounded by mountain laurel, azaleas, and hemlocks. For a close-up view of the cascading waters, hike to the top of the falls before descending into the gorge via a trail and suspension bridge.



Little Cedar Mountain Trail

715 TVA Road, Jasper, TN, 37347

Nestled along the western shoreline of the Tennessee River and Nickajack Lake, the 3.2-mile loop trail offers a moderately challenging hike with an average completion time of 1 hour and 20 minutes.



Fall Creek Falls State Park

2009 Village Camp Road, Spencer, TN, 38585

Fall Creek Falls State Park, one of Tennessee's largest, spans over 29,800 acres atop the Cumberland Plateau. Featuring one of the highest waterfalls in the eastern United States—the 256-foot Fall Creek Falls—it also has several other waterfalls, including Piney Falls and Cane Creek Cascades.



Valero Station

Sequatchie River Blueway Access Point

751 Old York Highway East, Dunlap, TN, 37327

One of the many public access points along the 116-mile stretch of the Sequatchie River for activities such as paddling, kayaking, and boating.



Chimneys State Natural Area

Chimney Park Road, Whitwell, TN, 37397

A 33-acre designated state natural area where Pocket Creek cuts through Cumberland Plateau sandstone to form Pocket Gorge. The Chimneys feature two pinnacles and a natural bridge of Pennsylvanian Warren Point sandstone that rise nearly 200 feet from the gorge floor.



Sequatchie Cave State Natural Area

Park Street, Sequatchie, TN, 37374

Sequatchie Cave, a 133-acre state designated natural area, has diverse aquatic and cave species, including the federally endangered Royal Snail and the rare Sequatchie Caddisfly.



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
